# John Nawrot, Morley Stanwood Elementary Principal

**April 23:** Lori Bruggema, Marla Estes, and I were part of a meeting with staff from the MOISD to roll out new guidance for qualifying students with a specific learning disability or SLD. This guidance establishes minimum thresholds for attendance and what can be considered a strength and formalizes the requirement that students have access to appropriate instruction and intervention. This guidance will likely result in fewer students qualifying for special education services under this area of eligibility.

**April 30 & May 1:** The kindergarten teachers spent time at the Stanwood Learning Center to observe the GSRP and Head Start classrooms. This is the second year of supporting the preschool to kindergarten transition in this way. Teachers were able to observe students in the classroom and meet with current teachers to get a better understanding of who students are prior to their arrival at kindergarten.

**May 5:** MSCS had an early release professional development day. The primary focus for most teachers was completion of competency scales tied to our standards-based learning work with Communications by Design (CBD). The SBG pilot team met with Zach Ripley, of CBD, to plan for some of next year's activities. Some staff also participated in Level II Blue Envelope training. This training provided a recap of data connected to student threats of self-harm at a local, ISD, and Blue Envelope program level.

**May 5 & May 6:** MSE hosted the Scholastic Book Fair. The spring edition was a buy one get one edition. A special thanks to Marla Estes, many of the Title I paraprofessionals, as well as members of our PTO for the time and energy it took to host a successful book fair.

**May 12:** MSE hosted a Family Game Night. More than 50 people (students and family members) attended an evening of board games and light refreshments. Board games support many of our instructional and behavioral goals; for example addition, 1:1 counting, turn taking, problem-solving and more. Board games provide an opportunity for students to practice these skills in a way that doesn't feel like "school."

**May 13:** A couple of make-up test sessions wrapped up the spring testing season at Morley Stanwood Elementary. In all 209, 3rd-5th grade students completed 575 M-STEP test sessions. Every student at MSE completed Fastbridge assessments in the areas of Mathematics and Reading.

## **On-Going Matters:**

A scheduling committee of teachers, paraprofessionals, ISD staff, and more is examining the elementary schedule and working on proposed changes that we hope will positively impact student learning outcomes.

The hiring process has started to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Mrs. Potrykus. Mrs. Medler's position was filled internally. We are also hoping to add a special education teacher, a first grade teacher, and a behavior interventionist this spring/summer.

## **Building Information:**

We are currently trying to solve some intervention space issues. The work areas that paraprofessionals use is quickly being filled by teaching staff. We have several solutions we will be looking at during the month of May. Most of it is portable self contained meeting areas that may be able to be set up in classrooms, hallways, and even the stage.

All curriculums will remain the same for the 2025-2026 School year. Purchases are currently being made so all resources are in place for the beginning of the year. Thanks to an influx in Title money our Bookworms curriculum received a much needed boost in replacement materials. Some digital materials in the HS/MS will not be replaced next year due to grant money running out.

#### Assessment

M-Step is wrapped up and we are now looking at some preliminary results. Each principal has access to embargoed results.

Instruction: Same as April

We applied for a 27H grant to help our mentoring program for teachers in their first three years. This will boost the mentor pay and provide us with more materials to steadily fill new teachers' toolboxes of skill.

## Professional Development/School Improvement

The School Improvement team finished their work on the Activity Worksheet on May 7th. This will allow for some guidance for our consolidated application to the state and also submitting our MICIP on June 17<sup>th</sup>.

We will be utilizing the updated version of 15 fixes for broken grades to guide our continued work with CBD. Our guidance team received them on May 5th during our last training.

The ISD will be providing an MTSS consultant to us mid year next year and we will begin to look at Tier I academic and behavior instruction and procedures. Our hope is to build a bigger "toolbelt" to help teachers reach the 80/20 standard at Tier I.
